Vidéo – Extrait du reportage “Kids learn repair skills with Team Repair”, *BBC London*, 2025.

**Journalist:** Now when was the last time you fixed something that was broken? It can sometimes feel easier to throw it out and replace it rather than to take time to repair it. Today a workshop was held for sixty school children from the boroughs of Tower Hamlet, Hackney and Islington where they were shown practical repair skills. It's all part of London Repair Week. With more than 200 events taking place across the city, Barry Caffrey went along.

**Team Repair woman:** Try and figure it on here. All your buttons should be working.

**Voice-over:** They're here to try and repair some old games consoles and learn about sustainability at the same time. Anaïs Engelman is co-founder of Team Repair, who are behind the project.

**Anaïs Engelman:** We always say we're kind of training up the next generation of sustainably-minded engineers and scientists. The best way to learn science and make it interesting is to get hands on and taking things apart and seeing how they work is the best way to do that and so that's why we're trying to give kids the experience we wish we had had growing up.
